WELCOME TO THE WEEK

Oundle International Organ Week is here once again. Merry music is heard throughout the town as students and tutors work together in sunlit chapels and churches.

For the fifth consecutive year this attractive town will become a truly international centre for music lovers and you are invited to enjoy the concerts, stroll around the stone-building-lined streets and explore the countryside.

You don't have to be an organ buff or aspiring player to enjoy the Week. The summer school welcomes observers and arranges a series of unusual concerts, providing participants and audiences with exciting performances.

Making imaginative use of attractive venues in Oundle and the many lovely small churches in the area, the concerts this year offer such a variety that all musical tastes and ages will find much to applaud. You might even discover new music that appeals to you, always an exhilarating experience.

Fotheringhay Church, a favourite venue, will be the setting for a performance of Baroque music by *Fiori Musicali*, one of today's leading early music groups. Other concerts to please lovers of chamber music include a piano recital by *Graham Jackson* and *Gert von Bülow* playing Bach's cello music.

The Choir of St Paul's Cathedral sings songs of praise from Byrd to Britten. Young musicians of the Copenhagen Youth Symphony Orchestra play Mozart's celebrated Clarinet Concerto and, commemorating 1789, music from the time of the French Revolution will be brilliantly presented by the fine brass ensemble The Wallace Collection.

A galaxy of organists includes *Nicolas Kynaston* in the glorious setting of King's College Chapel, Cambridge and *Gordon Stewart* playing the renowned instrument in Peterborough Cathedral. *Catherine Ennis* and *Kimberly Marshall* both make welcome returns to Oundle; *Jon Laukvik* and *Peter Sweeney* are here for the first time.

Although Oundle's summer school is non-competitive it is rightly regarded as a prior step to many organ scholarships and the prestigious St Alban's International Organ Competition. It is appropriate therefore that we open our concert programme with a recital by this year's winner of St Alban's. To end, many of the students attending the summer school will give a platform concert. Join us to see if you can spot a future winner.

DISCOVER MUSIC IN OUNDLE

Oundle is a thriving market town, one of the most charming in this region. Surrounded by country churches, fields of flourishing flocks, quiet river banks and the rolling Northamptonshire landscape, it is an ideal place in which to spend a few days or a week.
