C ince 1540 when Richard Storey probably played a small one or two manual organ with a dozen stops, Peterborough Cathedral has had several organs of varying size and in different locations. The present instrument is based on the organ presented in 1894 by John Harrison Foster, constructed by William Hill and Son. A rebuild took place in

1930/31 but by the late 1970s it was obvious that another complete restoration could not be delayed.


Work was carried out by Harrison and Harrison and finally completed in early 1982. The inaugural recital on the four manual, 106 stop organ was given by Nicolas Kynaston in July 1982.
