COURSES

Oundle '95 offers four courses for young organists; choose the one that you think best describes your present level and requirements or, if you need help in deciding, please phone James Parsons for advice.

EXPANDING YOUR REPERTOIRE (EYR)

usual age range: 13 - 17

Students in the earlier stages of discovering the pleasure of playing the organ will be stimulated and encouraged by the scope of this course. Group tuition to classes of about six is the normal pattern and there will be input from all the tutors.

STYLE AND TECHNIQUE (SAT)

usual age range: 16 - 22

Especially suitable for more accomplished players, students at university or music college, church organists and anyone for whom playing the organ is an important enthusiasm. Hands on seminars will be given to small classes and there will be the option to participate in choral sessions directed by Timothy Brown.

ADVANCED ACADEMY (AA)

usual age range: 19 - 22

If you and your teachers consider you have the potential for a career as an organist, either as a recitalist or church musician, this course will help you define your goals and pursue them. There will be opportunity for one to one coaching from the tutors, in addition to masterclasses and lectures for all.
