Oundle offers four courses for young organists. Choose the one That you think best describes your present level and requirements or, if you need help to decide, please 'phone for advice

Building Your Repertoire (BYR) usual age range: 13 – 17

Students in the earlier days of organ playing will be absorbed and encouraged by this course. Normally tuition is given to groups of about 6 and there will be input from all the tutors. The chance to try new organs and to meet many others with the same interest is an attractive feature.

Style and Technique (ST) usual age range: 16 – 22

Here is a course for more accomplished players, who may be students at university or conservatoire, church organists, or any for whom organ playing is an established enthusiasm. Classes will be small and there will also be the chance to join choral training

Advanced Academy (AA) usual age range: 19 – 22

If you and your teachers reckon that you have the chance of a career as an organist, be that as a recitalist or church musician, then this course could open doors for you. There will be opportunity for one-to-one coaching from the tutors in addition to masterclasses, excursions and lectures for all.

Prospective Organ Scholars (POS) usual age range: 16-18

Oundle's proven course for those aspiring to organ scholarships has for many proved a vital preparation for success in the September trials. There will be sessions on repertoire, technique, accompaniment, organ tests, improvising and choir training. Study days in Oxford and Cambridge, which include contact with college directors of music, further raise the effectiveness of the POS programme.

Full details of the works to be studied in preparation for the Oundle summer school will be sent to all applicants.

Students' Platform Concert


About a dozen students will be selected to play in the closing concert, to which many distinguished guests are invited.

hristopher Herrick (UK)

is at the peak of his career, well known worldwide through his tours and recordings. His immense repertoire spans the baroque, romantic and modern periods, and critics have been lavish in their praise of his Bach and Organ Fireworks CDs.



Ion Laukvik (Germany)

is a professor of organ at Stuttgart's Höchschule für die Musik; his teaching and charismatic playing won him many friends at Oundle's 1989 summer school, so it is high time he

contributed so powerfully to Oundle's 1995 summer school that all will cheer him back. This awesome artist has won first prize at every major organ competition in the world and is an effective, encouraging teacher.



François Espinasse (France)

is the young co-titulaire organist at St Severin in Paris, with an impressive clutch of prizes and recordings to his credit. His virtuoso technique is complemented by scholarship and

Hans Hellsten (Sweden)

is a distinguished pupil of Marie-Claire Alain, who has risen to international prominence as a brilliant player. He is professor of organ at Lund University in Malmö, specialising in baroque and avant-garde organ repertoire. This will be his second visit to Quadle



Timothy Brown (UK)

is director of music at Clare College, Cambridge. His choir training seminars at Oundle last year were a significant factor in the successes of many of Oundle's prospective organ scholars at the 1995 Oxbridge trials.

Martin Baker (UK)

is sub-organist of Westminster Abbey. His performances of Messiaen's music have won him much acclaim and he is admired for his skills as an improviser, as heard on Radio 3 at Christmas '95.



Ann Elise Smoot (USA/UK)

is an organ graduate of Yale University, now resident in London, where she is a tutor at the St Giles International Organ School and also a popular teacher at the RSCM.

Annette Richards (UK/USA)

was helped through awards and contacts gained at the early Oundle summer schools to proceed to study with Jacques van Oortmerssen in Holland and at Stanford University, California. Her career, as a player and a musicologist, has already been remarkable. She is now organist at Cornell University.
