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Oundle International Festival ~ a new era

Rose in Bloom is the title of Helle Thorborg's woodcut that graces our front cover. It reminds us of the lush beauty of an English summer in rural Northamptonshire, 'the rose of the shires'; it speaks too of the artist's skill and vision that can draw on the patterns of the natural world and refresh our spirits through their representation. In Oundle's attractive landscape, artists from many countries and diverse fields bring you the varied delights that compose our twelfth festival.

This year's festival, the first promoted by a new limited company, expands the cultural platform. Drama and film introduce an extra new dimension to the programming.

Murder in the Cathedral by T S Eliot, in a new production commissioned to herald a new era, will be given by a professional and community cast in the candlelit interior of Oundle Parish Church. A very rare 1952 film of the play, made in collaboration with Eliot himself, will lend another perspective to the dark, savage intrigues leading to the murder of England's great Saint and Martyr Archbishop Thomas Becket.

If Eliot's play cuts a sombre profile, there's verve a-plenty to redress. The passion of black gospel music is also something new for the festival: London Community Gospel Choir presents its salvation message with awesome panache. More delicate ethnic timbres resonate through the 136 strings of Pingxin Xu's Chinese dulcimer, whilst *It's a funny old world* by singer and humorist Stewart Collins should be a real rib-tickler!

So much for innovation. The established and cherished elements of the festival are ever present, well served by classical concerts and recitals of distinction.

We welcome as our young ensemble in residence Quadro Corydon, prize-winning baroque group from the Royal Conservatory of The Hague, playing period instruments. Eighteenth century musical themes are also explored in a special double bill: Norwegian Jon Laukvik performs on both organ and harpsichord, whilst *Farinelli*, recently released Golden Globe winning film, peeps into the


fantasy world of early opera. Fotheringhay church is the quiet country venue for the Schidlof String Quartet's programme of Debussy and Mozart; world-famous trumpeter Crispian Steele-Perkins sounds a fanfare in concert with the crystal tones of the Frobenius organ.

The usual cluster of international celebrity organ recitals promotes an interest in improvisation and transcription, skills which organists have long practised and coveted. Besides the fine organs in Oundle, featured instruments are those in Peterborough Cathedral, St John's College, Cambridge, and Great St Mary's, where the old Father Smith has just been restored. As ever, the lifeblood of the festival week will be over 50 young organists converging from home and abroad on Oundle, a town whose name has in the musical world become almost synonymous with the annual summer school.

Yes, this year's festival is a multi-faceted mixed media collage further spiced with exhibitions and community events. "We murder to dissect" wrote Wordsworth. So if this year's festival lacks any one binding thread, relax, savour all the themes and enjoy the party. Talking of parties, I hope you were amongst the fortunate few to book early for *Miller Magic*; the festival's now traditional *fête champêtre* has been sold out for weeks.
