This includes everything: tuition, accommodation, meals, travel during the Summer School week and admission to all the events promoted by Oundle International Festival, from Sunday teatime 13 July to Sunday teatime 20 July. All that you should bring in the way of extra cash is some pocket money to spend perhaps on extra snacks and drinks at the Club, or at the stall run by Oundle Music.

Accommodation and recreation

Students will live in Oundle School boarding houses, which are furnished and equipped to a comfortable level. Sports facilities (swimming pool, sports hall etc) will be open for supervised use at times during the week. Pastoral and medical care by qualified staff is an important feature of the arrangements for welcoming some 50 students.

Oundle School does not occupy a greenfield campus, remote from the ordinary world; its splendid buildings mingle with the old houses, quaint streets, shops and open spaces of Oundle's historic townscape.

Oundle itself, some 80 miles north of London, is easily reached by road or rail. By train, travel to Peterborough where you will be met by an OIF coach; by car, use the A14, which passes 8 miles to the south of Oundle.

To apply

Complete the Application and send to arrive by 1 April 1997.

A reference from your teacher or school director of music should be enclosed. Send no money with your application. You will hear by 30 April whether or not we can offer you a place; if so, a deposit of £100 will be required within a couple of weeks. The balance of the course fee should then be paid before 4 July 1997.

• Help with the fee

Thanks to the generosity of trust funds and other benefactors, we often provide students with some financial assistance. Last year over 33% of those attending the Summer School received a bursary to help towards the fee.

To be considered for a bursary, tick the box on the Application. You should then ask parents, teacher or director of music to write confidentially to James Parsons, to make your case. No promises! It is, however, our aim to assist dedicated students who genuinely find the course fee too steep.

On Saturday 12 July (the day before the Summer School begins) the Festival is promoting a performance of Brahms's German Requiem. The Festival Chorus will be a specially assembled Come and Sing choir, keen to project this wonderful work under the baton of former King's Singer, and BBC3 Radio 3 presenter, Brian Kay. Students will be most welcome. Please indicate on the Application if you would like to take part; there would be an additional £25 charge for meals and accommodation.
