For over a thousand years Taiko drumming has been used in Japan to celebrate village festivals, sound the rice-planting

season, drum up a storm, beat off famine and plague, and has been played ceremonially in temples and shrines.

Exciting to hear and to watch, the performance is a fusion of rhythm, dance and athleticism, with sounds ranging from those of tiny cymbals and gentle bells to the thundering of monstrous bass drums. The power of a Taiko drum performance comes from focused KI energy, much used in martial arts and the same as Chinese Chi.

Mugenkyo is Europe's foremost Taiko drum

group; its members studied under top Taiko masters in Japan. Since returning to Britain in 1994 they have built a solid reputation for their dynamic and powerful performances at theatres and festivals in the UK, Europe and Japan.
