typical age range 14-17

If you have taken up the organ fairly recently and have reached about grade 6 standard, this popular course will give you a massive boost. You will enjoy opportunities to play in small groups, and there are many organs in and around Oundle for your practising; there will also be visits to Cambridge.

Best of all, you will meet others with the same interest, make new friends in an informal, non-competitive environment, and doubtless come away with some valuable awards to help move you ahead.

STYLE & TECHNIQUE (ST)

typical age range 16-21

This programme caters for those who may be sixth-form students or who are in the early stages of a university or conservatoire course. Grade 8 is the threshold. Given the general fluency that you will already have gained at the organ, the tutors will be able to point you towards new horizons, introducing excitingly varied approaches for different musical styles: period fingering, articulation, organ management, improvisation will all be on the agenda. Benefit from their input as you move into more challenging areas of organ literature.

ENR and **ST** students will attend most of the concerts at the concurrent Oundle International Festival which offers a dazzling array of organ recitals, classical concerts, jazz, chamber and choral performances. They will also play a key role in providing music for the Festival Eucharist at Fotheringhay on Sunday 18 July.

The Festival Club, where students and tutors alike can relax, provides a focus for the evening activities.

Students Platform Concert

Distinguished guests from the organ world will be invited to the Platform Concert in Oundle School Chapel on Sunday 18 July at which some ST and ENR students will be invited to play.
