

Lessons with Langlais

David Briggs talks about his studies in Paris with Jean Langlais (1907-1991), one of the most influential figures in the organ world of 20th century France, and also displays his improvisation skills at the console.


Jean Langlais was born in 1907 in La Fontenelle, a small village near Mont-Saint-Michel in Brittany. Blind from the age of two, he studied in Paris at the National Institute for the Young Blind with great teachers including Albert Mahaut, a former pupil of César Franck, and the blind organist André Marchal. At the National Conservatory of Music in Paris he won First Prize in Organ in Marcel Dupré's class of 1930 and the Composition Prize in Paul Dukas' class of 1934. He also studied improvisation with Charles Tournemire, receiving in 1931 the 'Grand Prix d'Exécution et Improvisation des Amis de l'Orgue'.

Professor for forty years at the National Institute for the Young Blind, he also taught at the Schola Cantorum in Paris, where, between 1961 and 1976, he influenced both French and foreign students. His reputation as a teacher, improviser and performer drew pupils and audiences of many nationalities, especially from the USA where he gave 300 recitals and countless masterclasses. In 1945 he became the successor to César Franck and Charles Tournemire at the prestigious organ tribune of Sainte-Clotilde in Paris. He retired from the post in 1987 at the age of 80, having been titulaire for 42 years.

A prolific composer, his catalogue of works comprises 254 opus numbers, including vocal and instrumental sacred music (with 13 Masses, among them the celebrated 'Missa Salve Regina' and the 'Missa in Simplicitate', often performed in concerts), secular music and numerous organ works, some of which are considered to be twentieth-century classics. Jean Langlais died in Paris in 1991 at the age of 84.

One of the foremost concert organists of his generation, with a busy touring schedule, David Briggs has built a reputation as an exciting performer and communicator, with particular emphasis on orchestral transcriptions and the art of improvisation. David studied with Jean Langlais in Paris, transcribed (over a period of eleven years) many of the recorded improvisations of Pierre Cochereau, the celebrated Organist of Notre-Dame de Paris, won the Paisley International Improvisation Competition, became the first British winner of the Tournemire Prize at the St Albans International Improvisation Competition, and now gives masterclasses at the Royal Northern College of Music and Cambridge University. David is increasingly in demand as a composer; notable recent works including his millennial oratorio, 'Creation', 'Messe pour Notre-Dame' for two organs and choir, and 'Te Deum Laudamus' for the 125th anniversary of the Benedictine Abbey at Subiaco, Arkansas. His performance schedule includes some fifty concerts per year. He lives in New York.
