Every July, Oundle for Organists invites up to thirty-five students, male and female, to 'be' organ scholars in Oxbridge College Chapels. Last year we went to Cambridge – in 2007 we go to Oxford.

If you are aiming for an organ scholarship in the next two to three years, then this course is simply a 'must'! The same applies if you have actually gained a university organ award or are on a gap-year placement at a school or cathedral. All will gain huge benefit from the training offered by our proven and popular course.

Under inspired coaching you will overhaul your playing and keyboard skills. You will also gain experience of a collegiate-style choral world, where you will sing, conduct, accompany, play voluntaries, learn about liturgy, and perform two public Choral Evensongs and a Choral Mattins in different Chapels. You will sing Compline by candelight on two evenings.

Did you know ...?

An organ scholarship is one of the very best musical apprenticeships you can undertake!

There is enormous scope for dedicated and talented organ students to enter the music profession via an organ scholarship, gaining experience both in the organ loft and in front of choirs. There are vacancies at Oxbridge and other universities, in cathedrals, parish churches, concert halls, conservatoires and schools; there are undergraduate and post-graduate placements, plus many gap-year and sixth form opportunities all over the UK and overseas. 'Great scene!' But a note of caution: a lamentable lack of well prepared young musicians is much in evidence: nearly all the successful applicants have been boosted by an Oundle for Organists course.

Accommodation

Students and tutors will occupy comfortable rooms in The Queen's College (main College), right in the centre of Oxford on The High Street. All the University's beautiful historic buildings are within minutes' walk. Meals will all be taken in College.

Travel

Oxford is served by trains from London Paddington and London St Marylebone and rail access from other points is easily determined. By road use M40 etc.

For those travelling from abroad: Heathrow Airport offers a coach link, which leaves every 20 mins and stops right outside The Queen's College main gate.


