## MONDAY 14TH JULY

Dmitri Shostakovich (1906-1975) The Gadfly Suite, Op.97a

Dmitri Shostakovich graduated from the St Petersburg Conservatory as a brilliant pianist and composer, his First Symphony winning immediate favour, but his subsequent career in Russia varied with the political climate. In 1955 he wrote one of his most popular and accessible film scores for 'The Gadfly', made inside the Soviet Union, a sugary and entertaining costume drama based on a once very popular historical novel by the English writer Ethel Voynich. The hero is a swashbuckling revolutionary in Risorgimento Italy and the early 19th century Italian setting gives the composer a chance for delicious pastiches in the style of Bellini and Verdi, as well as pseudo-Neapolitan songs and folktunes. Most famous are the catchy Galop and the syrupy Romance, which has become popular as the theme music for the mini-series 'Reilly, Ace of Spies'.

#### Interval

Sergei Rachmaninov (1873-1943) Vocalise, Op.34

'Vocalise' was the last of a set of fourteen songs written by Rachmaninov in 1912 for voice and piano. Uniquely, it is wordless a pure melody, unfolding at rapturous length over gently shifting harmonies. It has been transcribed for every imaginable solo instrument and is a wonderful reminder of just what a gifted miniaturist Rachmaninov was, aside from his epic symphonies and concertos, and how expressively he could shape a long melody. A haunting, indefinable mixture of radiant contentment and aching melancholy, 'Vocalise' is a song in which words would truly be superfluous.

Igor Stravinsky (1882-1971) 'Berceuse' from the Firebird Suite

'The Firebird' was the first of the three great ballets that Stravinsky wrote for impresario Serge Diaghilev and his Paris-based Russian Ballet company in the years just before the First World War, the other two being 'Petrushka' and 'The Rite of Spring'. The story is an ancient Russian folk myth of human and supernatural forces and concerns a green-clawed ogre, Kashchei, who has a magic garden where he ensnares women and turns men to stone. Straying into the garden, Prince Ivan falls in love with one of the princesses ensnared by Kashchei. The Firebird tells Ivan how he can destroy Kashchei's power by smashing an egg hidden in a casket, which is really Kashchei's soul. Ivan duly smashes the egg, the monster dies, the captives are released, and everyone lives happily ever after.

Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-1893) Serenade for Strings

Second Movement: Valse: Moderato; Tempo di valse Finale (Tema russo): Andante; Allegro con spirito

The Valse of the second movement is Tchaikovsky's answer to the minuets of Mozart's serenades. Each string section takes a turn carrying the dancing melody in counterpart to rhythmic lines from the other sections. The Finale includes two Russian folk tunes: the first, a slow tune sung by Volga draymen, and the second an animated dance, which Tchaikovsky scores with some quickly pulsing, balalaika-like pizzicato in octaves.

Gerard Le Feuvre was born in Jersey in the Channel Islands in 1962. As a teenager he won scholarships to the Royal Academy of Music, the Banff School of Performing Arts in Canada and the Sibelius Academy in Finland. Over the last 20 years Gerard has given over 500 recitals mostly with the distinguished British pianist Nigel Clayton. He has had several works written for him and is an active composer himself, writing both for the cello and for his bassoonist wife Sarah. He was for seven years the cellist of the internationally renowned English String Quartet and is principal cellist of the Milton Keynes City Orchestra. As a freelancer, Gerard plays principal cello with the English Chamber Orchestra, the English Sinfonia, the Royal Ballet Sinfonia and the New Queen's Hall Orchestra. In 2000, the Royal Academy of Music awarded Gerard the title of Associate in honour of his outstanding achievements in the music profession.

Formed in 1985 by cellist Gerard Le Feuvre, the King's Chamber Orchestra is renowned as much for its humour and its pioneering improvisations as for its conventional repertoire. The KCO's members are distinguished musicians and friends whom Gerard has gathered together while freelancing with some of the finest orchestras in the country, and who share an interest in breaking down traditional barriers in order to reach a new generation.
