

ORGAN SCHOLARSHIP



Candidates are invited to apply for the Organ Scholarship at Dulwich College. The value of the Scholarship is up to one third of the tuition fees. This Scholarship may be supplemented by a means tested bursary if there is genuine financial need. The Scholarship also provides free tuition on organ and a second instrument or voice. Applicants are required to meet the academic requirements of the College.

The College has two organs on site and full use of a third in Christ's Chapel of God's Gift.

the 'simple' formula of earlier days — 'Organ Week' as it was affectionately known — when over 50 young organists of all ages and levels clustered round the local consoles for tuition during the Festival. Now internationally recognised as a brand that travels, Oundle for Organists is presented in partnership with the RCO, and offers residential courses and day events throughout the year, here in Oundle and at various locations. Each event is targeted to stated ages and stages.

In 2007-8, some 190 organists, aged 9-29, beginners through to conservatoire level, will have attended Oundle for Organists events – in Oundle, as in Cambridge, London, Ipswich, Birmingham and Toulouse.



John Scott is universally admired as one of the greatest organists on the international concert circuit. His programme juxtaposes reassuringly traditional classics of the organ repertoire with a little-known and only recently discovered piece by Messiaen, and the arresting timbres of organ and elctronic tape in Harvey's 'Toccata'. He concludes with the menacing, lyrical and ultimately triumphant strains of Reubke's celebrated 'Sonata'.
