

Basking in the recherché ambience of Maurice Duruflé's music, with its iconic references to Gregorian chant, its genesis in the soil of the French organ improvisatory tradition, and fastidious craftsmanship,



Frédéric Blanc's recital recreates the essence of a vibrant tradition. As the culmination of his programme he offers Duruflé's threemovement Symphony, improvised today on previously unseen, submitted themes.

Maurice Duruflé was one of the last great proponents of the French Romantic Organ School. For many years he was the organist at the church of Saint Etienne-du-Mont in Paris, on the north-east corner of the square where the massive Panthéon stands. Whilst his published output for organ only extends to five opuses, his fingerprint extends far beyond so apparently concise an oeuvre.

His 'Suite Op.5', published in 1934, is recognised as one of the landmark organ compositions of the twentieth century. 'Prélude' begins darkly, developing a chant-like melody through a process of gradual crescendo, to a stunning climax. A lyrical section intervenes before the movement closes as mysteriously as it began.

Of the two pieces included by Louis Vierne, the perennially popular 'Carillon de Westminster' began life as an improvisation at Westminster Cathedral, and famously misquotes the Westminster chimes.

In 1927 Vierne nominated Duruflé as his assistant at Notre-Dame; it was in 1954 that Duruflé transcribed from a recording Vierne's 'Méditation', improvised at Notre-Dame in 1928.

'Pelléas et Mélisande' is the incidental music for the London production of Maeterlinck's play which Fauré composed in 1898; its Prélude provided sumptuous fare for adaptation for organ, whilst the explosive energy of Tournemire's improvisation on the 'Te Deum' lives on in the reconstruction which Duruflé undertook from scratchy recordings.

Frédéric Blanc, now recognised as one of the world's leading exponents in organ improvisation, studied at Toulouse and Bordeaux Conservatoires, then further perfected his art with André Fleury, Marie-Claire Alain and Marie-Madeleine Duruflé, of whom he became a devoted disciple.

Winner at international competitions (Chartres 1996 and Paris 1997), he now enjoys a prestigious career as an international concert artist, with performances, broadcasts, masterclasses, and competition juror engagements throughout Europe and the USA. He is titulaire of the great Cavaillé-Coll organ in the Parisian Church of Notre-Dame of Auteuil.

Frédéric is the author of a monumental work of Maurice Duruflé; he has also reconstructed from recordings a number of the improvisations of the legendary Pierre Cochereau. He is Music Director of the Association Maurice et Marie-Madeleine Duruflé.
